SCALING – PART ONE By John Meyers

Why does garden railroading have so many different scales to deal with? If you are a new-comer to garden railroading, you might be as confused as I was when I started in the hobby. I won-dered why there are five different scales that all run on the same width track. Which popular manufacturers, use which scale? The smaller the scale number, the bigger the locomotive and rolling stock appears.

Bachmann and AccuCraft use 1:20.3, whereas

LGB of America uses 1:22.5;

Aristo-Craft, USA Trains and Art Knapp Trains of Canada use 1:29, and

Hartland Locomotive (HLW) uses 1:24.

MTH-RailKing and again Accucraft use 1:32.

Count them! There are 5 different scales ranging from 1:20.3 to 1:32. These two extremes represent the two main railroad systems used in America. The two systems are standard or mainline gauge which is $4'-8 \frac{1}{2}$ " between the inside rails and narrow gauge which is 3'-0" inside rails. The only thing common for all of these different scales is the track width of 45 mm or 1.77 inches.

To demonstrate that the 1:20.3 scale represents the narrow gauge train system, let's do the math. First, start with the track width of 45 mm or 1.77 inches and divide by 12 in/ft, then multiply by your scale number 20.3 (1.77 in \div 12 in/ft x 20.3 = 3.0 feet). Secondly, to demonstrate which scale represents the standard track system of 4' - 8 ½ ", do the math the same way, but this time use the 1:32 scale. (1.77 in \div 12 in/ft x 32 = 4.72 ft = 4' 8½"). The 4'-8½" is the standard width of the track used today; therefore, the 1:32 scale, according to some modelers, is the true Gauge-1 for garden railroading. This scale converts to 3/8" = 1'.

LGB uses the metric measurement based on one meter between the inside rails of the track. The scale for LGB is 1:22.5 and goes like this: $(1.77 \text{ in} \div 12 \text{ in/ft} \times 22.5 = 3.32 \text{ ft})$ which converts to 1 meter in the metric system. This demonstrates that the track width of 45 mm in scale units is 1 meter.

HLW manufactures their line of G trains in 1:24 scale. This scale works out prototypically to 3'6" width between rails. Many countries in the southern hemisphere use this system. It is also popular with modelers who make scaled buildings because it is easy and convenient to work with. This scale of $\frac{1}{2}$ in = 1 ft is also popular in the doll house hobby. Once again the calculations go like this: $(1.77 \text{ in} \div 12 \text{ in/ft x } 24 = 3.54 \text{ feet})$ which converts to 3'6" between the rails.

Aristo-Craft and USA trains both have made the scale of 1:29 popular. Aristo-Craft decided that 1:29 scale was a much closer match to the 1-3/4" (45 mm) track gauge, to produce a visibly larger model than a 1:32 scale model. This seems to be an odd scale and if you do the math it does not seem to match any standard railroad. With the G-scale models, precise scale is not as import as proportions—the size of one model relative to another. However, if you are running trains in 1:32 and 1:29 scale, structures in your towns and villages made from 3/8" scale will all look good. On the other hand, if you are running both 1:29 and 1:22.5 scale trains, structures in your layout made form ½" scale will look good.

In summary, there are at least 5 scales to deal with in this hobby of garden railroading, and generally most of us do not pay a great deal of attention to them when it comes time to purchase a new engine that appeals to the eye. On the other hand, there are some who are conscious of scale and want to make their garden layout prototypical to the narrow gauge era of the 1890's and want everything scaled to 1:20.3. Or they want to stay pure to Gauge 1 and make everything resemble the standard railroad era of the 1940's and 50's using 1:32 scale or 1:29 scale because it represents the modern era of the big powerful diesels pulling container cars and center beam flat cars. No matter what appeals to you, let's keep the garden trains rolling!


